PRIEST IN CHARGE

Easter Then and Now

By 'then' I only mean this time last year. There were many confusions as we went stumbling into the restriction of normal liberties and the establishment of safe practice, while around the globe there was the struggle to understand the range and nature of this strange and deadly threat. Easter was suddenly a private observance, as were all religious festivals. We were all on high alert, learning to recognise everyone else by their eyes, and some lapsing into that alarming jerk backwards. Estimates of 'two metres' vary widely. We were all on a steep learning curve. But humanity, as ever, prevailed. There were suddenly new kindnesses being shown, eyes smiled, the young served the old, and we learned to surmount the limitations, just to make life a little more palatable. Here, we have been so fortunate. At the same time we have been ever conscious of the exhaustion and the loss of life in our large population centres and their hospitals. The loss of singing in church and the loss of the chalice must rank lowly by any sort of comparison, but, in a sort of symptomatic way, have been keenly felt by many. And there is a curiously spectator element in televised worship. We have become weary, while perhaps feeling we have no right to feel that way in comparison to those on the 'front line'. A bit like the sleeping disciples in Gethsemane, while the drama unfolded elsewhere. Easter 'now' feels like tentatively starting over again. We have seen much kindness, reflecting something of the kindness of God in giving his only Son. In coping with the real and imagined tensions of the past year, we also need now to be kind to ourselves and recoup our core of spiritual energy. This has all been familiar territory for Christians, real experience with its joys and sorrows, and Holy Week and Easter have both. I wish you all the blessings of Easter.

EASTER SERVICES

Unless the situation changes, the Church will be open for Communal Worship from 28th March, Palm Sunday, as detailed above. The Maundy Thursday service on 1st April will be via Zoom and a link to join this will be sent to everyone on the communicant list. If you know of anyone who may wish to join, who is not a Church member please ask them to email Christine so that they can receive the invitation link.

The previous arrangements for protecting everyone from Coronvirus remain in place. Therefore please remember that face coverings must be worn, to use the hand sanitizer on entry and exit from the Church, and to maintain a 2 metre distance from anyone not in your household. We are still required to keep contact details of those attending Church for three weeks. Thank you for your co-operation.

Things are looking more hopeful that we may be able to resume some fund raising events later in the year. I also hope we may be able to meet to plan for this eventuality even if it's outdoors!

REPORT FROM REGIONAL COUNCIL

Galloway Regional Council met virtually last month for our usual quarterly meeting. This time we were joined by Bishop Kevin and Dean Reuben on their 'tour' of Galloway. Hopefully next time they visit it will be in person!

We had a particularly interesting discussion about the use of new technology in worship. All Saints Lockerbie and St John's Moffat have really got to grips with all that is available and now have two online services a week, using film material from the local area as well as readers and intercessions from different members of their congregations and retired clergy in the area. One unexpected benefit has been that former members of the church who have moved away are now able to join in online. Another point raised concerned those who do not normally attend a church service and who might feel intimidated at the thought of coming into a strange building where they are not sure what to do. An online service shines a light on what happens inside without the newcomer feeling that everyone is staring at them. And as well as online services, the Dean has been recording services on DVD to send to the housebound. From the clergy point of view, both the Bishop and the Dean commented on how their preaching styles have to change for a recorded service because there is not the same immediacy – for instance the Bishop preached his Palm Sunday sermon to an empty cathedral in the first week of March. Lots of different options out there, some of which take a bit of getting used to, but it is all food for thought and we came away feeling that we must all be a bit more open to some of these new ideas.

At the end of the meeting, Dean Reuben closed with a prayer from **Thomas Merton** which seemed particularly apt at the moment and so I repeat it here.

PRAYER

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road, though I may know nothing about it. Therefore will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.
