#### GALLOWAY REGIONAL COUNCIL

The Galloway Regional Council met at St John's Moffat on 28th August.

We were given a warm welcome by St John's and it was nice to be part of their celebrations for the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of their church.

The Revd John Macleod and his wife Maggie were guests. John had been the priest at St John's prior to Paul Singh, and he had been Convenor of the Regional Council. John had been asked to talk to us about his experience of pilgrimage – he came dressed as a pilgrim including his staff, scallop shell, hat etc. He spoke most movingly of his recent pilgrimage from Seville to Santiago de Compostela – 1000km and the longest of the Camino routes.

We then had an interesting group discussion about pilgrimage in Dumfries and Galloway and what we could do to promote/encourage this. Many interesting ideas were noted and the current Convenor (N Wise) and next Convenor (Janice Aiton) are meeting next month to try and put some flesh on the bones.

Items of interest from the meeting:

A report from the Diocesan Council included progress on the Diocesan Environmental Group which has now met two times – Canon Stuart Bain (Challoch) is Convenor. Bulletins have been prepared (and now sent) to all charges. As well as useful tips on eco best practice, these also use scripture to keep us all mindful of God's creation. Much discussion about NZAP (Net Zero Action Plan) from the Province – the DEG is trying to steer towards achievable outcomes in this Diocese.

#### **AUTUMN RECIPE**

#### Courgette Curry: For that glut of courgettes!

Prep: 20 mins Cook: 40 mins Serves 4

#### **Ingredients**

3 medium courgettes

2-3 tbsp sunflower oil

1 red onion, halved and finely sliced

1-2 red chillies, finely chopped

40g ginger, peeled and finely grated

4 garlic cloves, finely grated

2 tsp garam masala

1 tsp ground cumin

1 tsp ground turmeric

400g can chickpeas, drained

400g can chopped tomatoes

400g can coconut milk cooked

basmati rice, to serve

#### Method

**Step 1** Trim the ends of the courgettes, halve them lengthways and, using a teaspoon, scrape out the watery seed from the centre (it's fine if you don't get all of them). Roughly slice the courgette halves, then roughly chop the seeds and reserve for later.

**Step 2** Heat 2 tbsp oil in a large frying pan over a medium heat and fry the sliced courgettes until golden, about 8-10 mins. Remove from the pan, leaving the oil behind, then add the onion and a further tablespoon of oil if necessary, along with a good pinch each of salt and pepper. Fry for 6-8 mins until soft and just starting to turn a light brown, then tip in the chillies, ginger and garlic, and cook for 2 mins until starting to soften. Stir in the spices and cook for another 30 seconds.

**Step 3** Scatter in the chickpeas and pour in the tomatoes, coconut milk and reserved courgette seeds. Simmer over a medium-low heat for 10 mins before adding the courgettes back to the pan and cooking for a further 8-10 mins.

Serve with basmati rice and sides of your choice.
