### November: A Month to Remember

Dear Friends,

As November dawns upon us, it brings with it a time of reflection and gratitude. At St Margaret's, we will be marking our remembering in two ways.

Firstly, on **Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November** within our usual **10.30am** service, we will marking the Feast of All Saints and All Souls, where we take time to remember those we love who have gone before us, alongside those whose lives have been examples of faith and sacrifice. Often they are people who have lived out their faith under difficult and dangerous circumstances.

Secondly, we will be joining millions of others across the world in commemorating Remembrance Sunday, a day when we pay tribute to the men and women who have sacrificed so much for the cause of peace and freedom. Those who lost their lives, and those who returned home forever changed.

### **Remembrance Sunday Service**

Please join us on **Sunday, November 12th**, for a special joint Remembrance Sunday service at St Margaret's, as we join with Kells Church to remember together. We will gather at the War Memorial from **10.45am**, in time to hold the two minute silence at 11.00am, marking the time in WWI when the guns fell silent. This will also involve the laying of poppy wreaths and the Last Post and Reveille. We will then move over to the church for a short service with hymns and prayers.

These are times for us to come together as a community, to remember those we love and miss so dearly, and those who served in times of conflict. We take a moment to offer our prayers for peace and unity, particularly in these times of discord and conflict that mark our world today.

May this November be a month of reflection, gratitude, and unity as we remember and honour those who have sacrificed for our freedom.

### Why do we Wear a Poppy on Remembrance Day?

The poppy is the enduring symbol of remembrance of the First World War. It is strongly linked with Armistice Day (11 November), but the poppy's origin as a popular symbol of remembrance lies in the landscapes of the First World War.

Poppies were a common sight, especially on the Western Front. They flourished in the soil churned up by the fighting and shelling. The flower provided Canadian doctor John McCrae with inspiration for his poem 'In Flanders Fields', which he wrote whilst serving in Ypres in 1915. It was first published in *Punch*, having been rejected by *The Spectator*. In 1918, in response to McCrae's poem, American humanitarian Moina Michael wrote 'And now the Torch and Poppy Red, we wear in honour of our dead...'. She campaigned to make the poppy a symbol of remembrance of those who had died in the war.

Artificial poppies were first sold in Britain in 1921 to raise money for the Earl Haig Fund in support of ex-servicemen and the families of those who had died in the conflict. They were supplied by Anna Guérin, who had been manufacturing the flowers in France to raise money for war orphans. Selling poppies proved so popular that in 1922 the British Legion founded a factory - staffed by disabled ex-servicemen - to produce its own. It continues to do so today.

Other charities sell poppies in different colours, each with their own meaning but all to commemorate the losses of war. White poppies, for example, symbolise peace without violence and purple poppies are worn to honour animals killed in conflict.

The poppy continues to be sold worldwide to raise money and to remember those who lost their lives in the First World War and in subsequent conflicts.

# **AUTUMN RECIPE**

### Apple Crumble Cake – for the glut of Apples

Cook: 1hr 15 mins (or until golden). 360f or 180c, Gas 4 Serves 8/10

### Ingredients 4oz margarine 4oz castor sugar Half teaspoon vanilla essence 2 eggs 6oz self raising flour Pinch salt 1 tablespoon milk (optional) 12oz cooking apples peeled, cored and sliced Topping: 3oz hard margarine 4oz self raising flour 3oz castor sugar1 tablespoon water

Method

**Step 1** Cream fat and sugar till pale and fluffy. Beat in eggs and vanilla essence.

**Step 2** Fold in flour and salt. Moisten with milk, if necessary, to make a still dropping consistency.

**Step 3** Turn mixture into a deep 8½ inch greased, loose bottom cake tin. Arrange apples on top.

Step 4 Make topping – rub margarine into flour, stir in sugar and water.

Step 5 Sprinkle topping over apples, bake in oven. Can be frozen.
