

### SAINT FRANCIS: THE HOLY FOOL

A concept that has always piqued my interest is so-called 'Fools' for Christ, a term which has its origins in 1 Corinthians. A holy fool is one who flouts societal norms for religious purposes, consistently rejecting worldly cares, social rules of hypocrisy, brutality and power-seeking. Fools are often mocked and humiliated as they subvert the illusions by which we all live.

One such fool is Saint Francis of Assisi, whose feast day marks the end of our season of creation. An enduringly popular patron saint, Francis is well-known for his veneration of nature as a place of divine encounter, but he is more than an animal-loving eccentric who preached to the birds. Pope Francis, his namesake, wrote of him as someone who shows us how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society and inner peace.

As a young man, Saint Francis rejected his inherited wealth and status and went on to live joyfully in simplicity – a true ascetic who cared for outcasts and translated the poverty of the beatitudes into a way of life. In this sense he took on a prophetic role, not by noisy denunciation, but by being the change he wished to see.

What appeals most about holy fools is the humour. The capacity for irony and paradoxical wisdom. Although Francis took his calling seriously, he did not take *himself* too seriously. His sacred function was to tear down the illusions we hold so dear – relating to materialism and power – and to challenge social norms through playfulness, humour, and unconventional behaviour.

We live in a world which extols wealth and power, in which manners and respectability supersede honesty, and in which the church has neglected and failed those who society has marginalised. Against this context — whether in the twelfth century or the twenty-first — making a deliberate choice of downward social mobility is radical. But God is the God of those who know that they have nothing but him. And these are the people who have everything to look forward to.

The delight of Francis, the *Jongleur de Dieu*, might look like naivete or romantic idealism. But it is impossible to carry the wisdom of this archetype without having undergone some serious disillusionment. Holy fools dwell in the tragic gap between the ideal and the real, between what we wish we and others could be and what we and they are. And finding our own inner fool means we can live unselfconsciously as who we are rather than trying to conceal it under an orchestrated persona designed to impress – without losing sight of the more we can be.

Humility was Francis' cornerstone and he was able to avoid the extremes of both self-inflation and self-doubt. His was a life of simplicity, single-mindedness and wholeheartedness. God was his go-to, his starting place, and his ending place. Francis recognised the radical counter-intuitiveness of God's priorities, that the state of life which Jesus himself blessed throughout his ministry is one that the world cordially dislikes.

Like Francis and the long line of holy fools, we could do worse than acknowledging our complete dependence on God, being willing to sacrifice – materially or otherwise – and create belonging with people who don't belong. To live like Jesus means unreasonably extending our welcome, our compassion, and our joyful understanding with others – regardless of the messy consequences.
